

## Professors Join In UFO Study Forum

*(The following article appeared in a recent Stanford University publication and is presented here to alert interested UFO researchers to the existence of the new society under the leadership of Peter A. Sturrock, and ASSOCIATE of CUFOS.)*

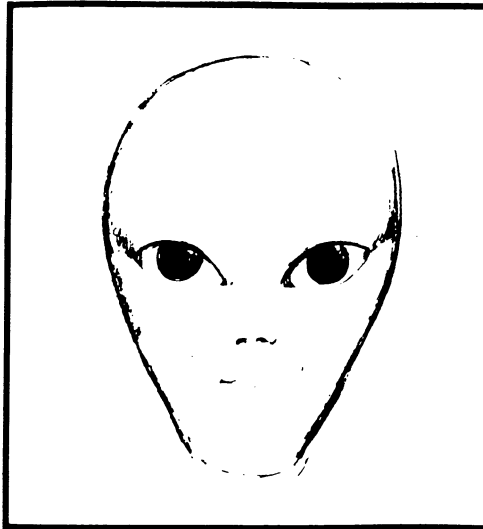
Over 100 professors of North American universities have joined together to form a society which will provide a forum for discussion of such "anomalous" phenomena as parapsychology and unidentified flying objects (UFO's), according to a letter published in SCIENCE magazine.

This organization, the Society for Scientific Exploration, is the outcome of some six years of negotiation among a founding committee of 14 scientists. Three are members of the National Academy of Sciences. Bart Bok, professor of astronomy at the University of Arizona, Thomas Gold, professor of astronomy at Cornell, and Roger Shepard, professor of psychology at Stanford.

Members range from Allen Hynek of Northwestern University, one of the more outspoken supporters of UFO research, and Charles Tart of the University of California at Davis, an advocate of studies in parapsychology to staunch skeptics including eight members of the Committee for the Scientific Investigation of Claims of the Paranormal, including its chairman, philosopher Paul Kurtz of the State University of New York at Buffalo, and University of Washington psychologist Ray Hyman.

The first president of the society is Peter A. Sturrock, professor of space science and astrophysics at Stanford. Sturrock has long been interested in the UFO phenomenon.

## First Reported CEIII Alien Communicating With Deaf-Mute

An interesting series of sighting reports from a Colombian deaf-mute artist have been forwarded to the Center for UFO Studies by ASSOCIATE Investigator Virgilio Sanchez-Ocejo (P.O. Box 313, Opa-Locka, FL 33054).

Although the details of the reports have not been verified by on-site investigation or other means by CUFOS, Dr. Hynek has met and communicated in writing with the witness and believes the information received should be noted by other investigators of the UFO phenomenon. The case is offered here without evaluation. Many questions about the case remain unanswered.

The artist, William Ortiz (227 Camsler Avenue, Knoxville, Tennessee 37919) claims to have had three UFO encounters. His first experience was in 1950, at which time his hearing was temporarily restored. His second encounter was in 1969 when it was again restored temporarily. In 1975, however, his third experience did not result in a hearing improvement. All three experiences occurred in Colombia, where he was born in 1937 in the city of Bucaramanga. He lost his hearing at the age of five.

The accompanying sketch by Mr. Ortiz is his representation of heads of the aliens. It greatly resembles sketches by others of other reported CEIII cases elsewhere. Also on file we have a series of other sketches in which Mr. Ortiz shows the hand signals used by the reported aliens to communicate

## CORRESPONDENCE

(We include in our CORRESPONDENCE section this time three reports from one witness. To those who believe that multiple reports must be misperceptions because they have looked for many, many years and have seen NOTHING that might have been a real unidentifiable flying object we offer more grist for their mills. These are offered as interesting samples of the types of information which comes to our attention at the Center. Here is your chance to read some of our interesting daily mail.)

(#1) At about 2:00 AM early one morning in June of 1964 a girlfriend and I were coming home from a dance at a small place north of Santa Barbara, (California). It was a very black night, with only faint starlight, and we were talking as we drove homeward. The subject of discussion is forgotten, but it had nothing to do with what we saw.

We were driving down between two elongated hills into a sort of valley where during the day one could have seen many miles ahead down between the hills. Suddenly, we thought it was morning (dawn), for the sky became almost instantly light, but it didn't seem to make sense because we left the dance at around 1:30 AM and we hadn't been driving for very long. As I recall, our watches showed the time to be about 2:00 AM.

By this time, the sky above was like

daylight, except that we could see that this daylight effect was limited to a certain radius beyond which it was still dark. It didn't take much brain power for us to realize that there was a light source above our car, so I stopped the car and we leaned forward and looked up through the windshield.

What we saw was a circular, glowing object which had the appearance of molten metal or, better yet, appeared like an electric stove element turned on "high heat" and seen in the dark.



The two of us were terrified, although I tried not to show it, and our only concern was "what was this thing and was it going to harm us?"

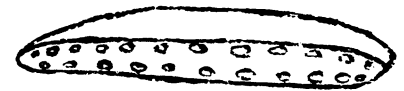
The round object was motionless (and) appeared to be approximately 100 feet high and perhaps 40 feet in diameter. It seemed to emit heat, but made no sound. There were no visible seams or doors, but it had definite shape. It stayed only about two minutes, then sped off in the direction we were headed as if it were lightning. It lit up the valley as it went and we could see that it travelled many miles (perhaps 30 or 40 miles) in about one minute. It grew small in visual size very rapidly and disappeared in no more than a minute.

Our feeling was one of relief at this point and we discussed possibilities and probabilities of what this thing was (from possible extraterrestrials to secret government military projects) as we drove home.

(#2) During August of 1979 I was looking south through a new telescope at approaching passenger planes and, as it was just beginning to get dark, I (was) thinking about waiting to observe perhaps one star and then I'd pack up for the night. I made a couple of sweeps with the telescope to try to locate an early star, when I observed something in the sky at a great distance approaching from the southeast (not south, which is the plane route).

I could see a faint light beam below the object even at this range. It didn't register even yet that this wasn't a plane, but as it approached I noticed that there were no wings and no flash-

ing lights on the extremities (red and green). My wife later confirmed this.



At the angle I was viewing the object (at this point, at about 45°), it appeared oval shape. I could see it very clearly now and could see definition in the object and could also see about 12 to 18 lights, evenly spaced, on the circumference of the bottom. As the object stopped at this point, I had a chance to observe it very well. It made no sound and was motionless for about 30 seconds.

By this time, I realized that I was watching something very extraordinary. I knew no one would believe me, so I screamed to my wife, who was reading in bed. She came flying out on the patio to see what was wrong and I told her to look up and describe to me what she saw through the telescope. She said, "I don't need any telescope" and, as we both looked up with the naked eye, the object had come closer and was at very close range.

Being directly overhead now, the bottom was observed as being perfectly circular with no visible seams, rivets, etc. I again observed it through the telescope for a better view as it arched off to the east (not consistent with its earlier path). My wife said the object was silver gray (at the time). Neither of us can remember what color the lights were, but they gave off constant beams (no flashing) downward. The object was very defined and I could see no seams of any kind and it appeared to be smooth and shiny. (What bothered me then and even now is that I had no fear of it as I did on my California experience. I actually wanted it to come down.)

(#3) On April 13, 1980 I was leaving Halifax on a 60-mile trip to my home (eastward). (I was thinking about a discussion I had just had with a physician about business.) As I left Halifax city limits, I noticed a very bright star in the sky maybe 15° above the horizontal. (I look at the sky often enough to know that that star didn't belong there.) It looked so unusual that I couldn't take my eyes off it. Each mile I travelled brought me closer to

this light. After 5 or 6 miles, I could tell that this was two lights, very close together (side by side). A few more miles travelled caused the lights to become larger and the lights separated more. By the time I travelled 25 miles, I could see that what was in the sky was an object with two lights (one on either side). Each mile I travelled now made the object become larger to the eye at a very rapid rate.

My only thoughts were, "What (is that) up there this time?" There was a time that the object was out of view due to the terrain (high hills and tall trees). When the object could again be seen, it was almost upon me and almost directly overhead. I looked ahead on the highway and a tractor-trailer was stopped for the lone driver to urinate in the woods. The driver had returned to his truck just as I came along and I could see him looking up at the object. I passed the truck and pulled over to get a good look.

I got out of the car and looked up and was overcome with awe at the tremendous size of the object. It was incredibly large. I estimated it to be between 1,000 and 1,200 feet long. It was shaped like a very fat cigar. It had a light on front and back, one on each side, and a tiny red light on dead center. It had definite shape, but no visible seams. The light were only small in relation to the object, which made no sound. The object appeared to me, even at its height, to be many times larger than the tractor-trailer (18 wheeler). I wrote down the license number of the tractor-trailer, but didn't talk to the driver until a few weeks later when I heard of a truck driver who had seen a UFO. I spoke with him by phone (and he) not only confirms my account of the sighting but also refers to other encounters he has had in the past, one of which involves a very bright disc directly about his car which disabled his engine temporarily before the disc took off.

Again, I am puzzled at the fact that I felt comfortable about the experience and had no apparent fear. It was as if I was ready to welcome some sort of extraterrestrial.

Dear Sirs:

I have had a close encounter of the first kind, but it was a few years ago (4 or 5) when I lived in Halltown, Missouri. I was 13 or 14 and didn't know where to report it, but the military probably did. What I, my Dad and Mom, two brothers and a sister saw looked like a flying radio tower. We watched it fly around for 30 to 40 minutes before the three jets came in at low level at 30 second intervals. The UFO broke up and scattered, jets chasing, for about 1½ to 2 minutes before regrouping and going straight up. The jets searched, but were unable to find any trace of it.

I guess that you would or could call that a UFO.

He says that there is no scientific organization that provides an outlet for serious papers on anomalous science.

"If anybody wanted to know facts about the UFO phenomenon he couldn't go to a physics library and find journals covering the subject, couldn't find textbooks written by responsible, well-known people covering it," Sturrock says.

"There's nowhere that you can go for reputable information."

He says that the society will not duplicate the work of the Kurtz committee. "The society is open to all points of view, and it can grow indefinitely. A committee is necessarily limited in size, and members usually have a common viewpoint.

The committee for the Scientific Investigation of Claim is of the Paranormal publishes a journal, usually devoted to debunking claims of paranormal phenomenon like the Bermuda Triangle and "psychic" Uri Geller.)

"The Society will be neutral. "Its purpose is to provide a forum in which information can be exchanged and every shade of opinion can be expressed.

"The society includes not just physical scientists and astronomers, but anthropologists, historians, MD's, philosophers, psychologists, and sociologists. We would like to add a few good trial lawyers."

"We also hope to learn from history by reconsidering, for instance, the meteorite controversy. How could the French Academy of the 18th century have saved itself from a historic booby when it decided that meteorites are stones struck by lightning, since 'stones cannot fall from the sky?' How can scientists of the 20th century avoid making a similar mistake?

"The fact that something sounds crazy does not mean there's nothing to it. If we did not have the theory of relativity to guide us, what is called a 'black hole' would sound absurd.

"Most of our members are completely uncommitted."

Several Stanford scientists are members of the society, including Ronald A. Howard, professor of engineering-economic systems, who is editor of the journal; and Persi Diaconis, professor of statistics and Shepard, who were members of the founding committee; Sidney Hook of the Hoover Institution; John D. Krumholtz, professor of education and psychology; William A. Tiller, professor of materials science and engineering; Walter G. Vincenti, professor of aeronautics and astronautics, and Arthur B.C. Walker Jr., associate professor of applied physics.

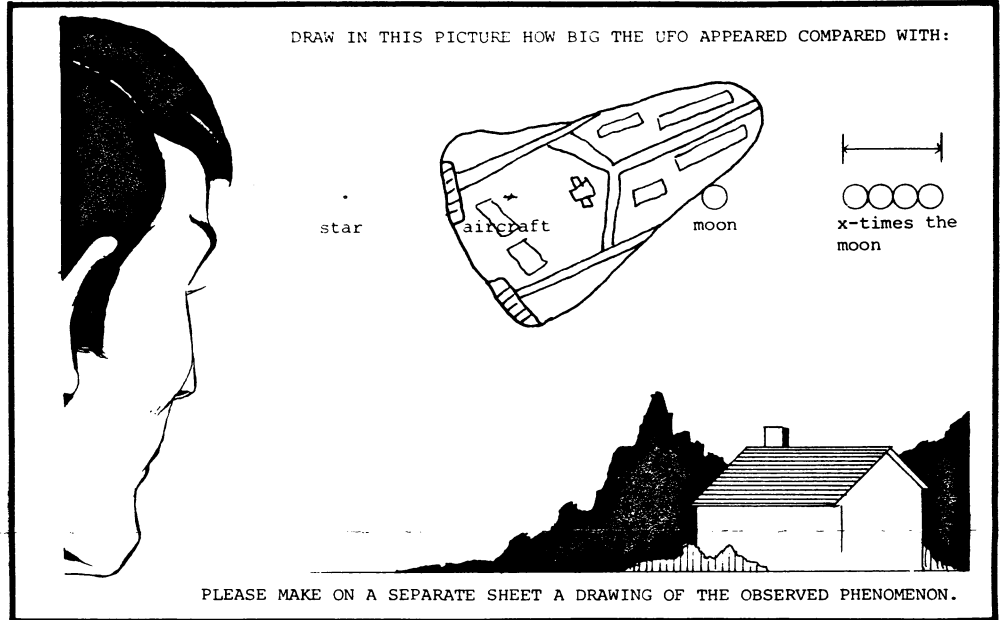

At the time of the sighting, I was spreading fertilizer on a meadow close to my house. I was alone at the time. I had nothing on my mind other than what the next job of the day might be.

As I am fascinated by hawks, I usually watch the sky as I work outdoors on the farm. This particular afternoon I was drawn by a heavy warm force to focus my attention to the narrow strip of woods at the highest part of our farm.

In an instantaneous reponse, I glanced to see a huge medium gray colored object hovering over the corner of the top edge of the wooded strip. The shape was similar to that of a pear and it did not "fly" horizontal, but rather at an angle. I could see what appeared to be extending support (solid) girders that ran at various angles on the body, also an oddly shaped "box" near the center underside, the likeness of a cross, but may have been partially supported by girders. Two large plates that seemed to be moving in and out were near the base of the body. Two copper-colored cylinders in a horizontal position were at each side of the base, slightly glowing, or color may have been distorted. These cylinders were ribbed. There were also several other protrusions that seemed to be operating side to side, underneath the body, near the center and near the nose of the object. (Please refer to drawing for locations of described items).

It was visible for approx. 30-35 seconds; the day was overcast, cool and had not rained nor was a storm evident. I never had the chance to view the upper side (if in fact I was looking at the underside) of the object as it passed behind a large dark gray cloud and was not again visible.



I might add that the winds that day were approx. 18-23 mph. no gusts. The objects size was at least 230 feet across and 340-350 feet long. Its hovering path was approx. 600-700 feet above the tops of the trees but did not seem to effect the trees movements or the ground area.

X There was a definite "pulling or drawing" force exhibited by the object; it was not severe nor did injury appear, but it was extremely evident.

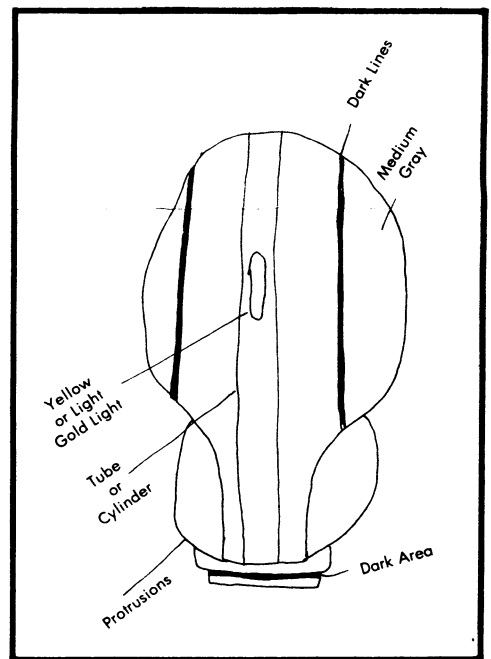
My father and I were standing talking with a boarder (we board race horses) at the entrance to our lower stable. My father first noticed the object and made a comment for me to look at its movement and design. The day was sunny, with a few clouds, the object was flying below the clouds at approx. 1,000 feet.

It was grayish-black in color and maintained the same height while flying at a slight curve, but vertical, from East to West. The object did not appear to be very large approx. 20-25 feet in length, approx. 8-10 feet wide. It was nearly shaped like a light bulb, with highly visible ribs and dark (black) lines. The object was medium gray in color, but did show reflection at times from sun.

At the time, we thought it may be a weather balloon, but afterwards realized it was going against the wind direction, that was blowing West to East at 10-15 mph.

The 3rd party was not looking at the object as he had entered the barn to view his horses. He was not asked, either, to view the object in question.

We lost sight of the object as it seemed to climb slowly and gradually disappeared by traveling farther out (distance). A/N

Dear Dr. Hynek,

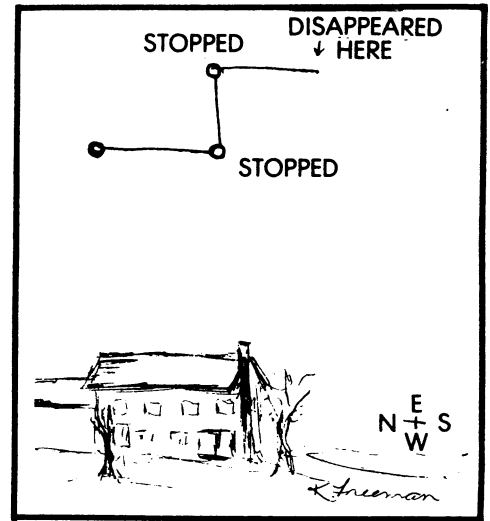
This letter is in reference to our phone conversation on June 25, 1982 at 9:30 a.m. As I told you on the phone, never in a million years did I ever think I would have reason to look up your number. I am, I think, a reasonably sane mother, wife and citizen, but I felt an obligation to notify someone about my experience last night at 2:30 a.m. I had to go outside because our pump for our underground sprinkler system sounded strange and I wanted to check if the heads were working properly. They weren't, so I had to turn on the outside hose. (I felt I should explain so you don't think this is my nightly habit.)

It was such a beautiful, clear night I couldn't resist just looking up at the stars. Anyway, I focused on what I thought was the closest star, wishing I had more knowledge about astronomy because it seemed so close. Then, I thought it's too low to be a star. It must be a plane very far away because it didn't seem to be moving. Then suddenly, it proceeded to move to the right which would be south, very quickly, and by the relation to its size and the distance it traveled, my first instinct was it must be a shooting star. But then it stopped. Then about 30 seconds later it went straight up, made another right turn, was in view, then totally disappeared. I just stood there trying to rationalize what I had seen. My first instinct was, it must be a satellite of some kind or a weather

device, but then I realized there was nothing to my knowledge that could possibly have that kind of speed from a standing position.

I came in and immediately drew a picture of what I had seen so I wouldn't forget, (as if I ever would!) I know I will never see anything like it again, and I actually feel a little lucky. I was very hesitant to call you, and even more hesitant to mention it to my friends, they already think I'm a little nuts. As I mentioned to you, after seeing some interviews on this subject, too many people feel the same way and are afraid to mention their experiences. I am more fascinated than ever in your work now.

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Sir:

I heard you in KFBK radio the other day and thought I would tell you about two UFO sightings I have seen.

1) While in the Navy, aboard the USS Maddox, D.D.731, we were between Midway Island and Japan during 1956-57. Just before sunset, there were about thirty of us on the fantail (stern) with the 5".38 caliber mount turned sideways to serve as a projection screen. It was about 7:45 PM and we were about to start the movie when we saw a light, believed to be red, coming straight at us at a slow rate of speed (approx. 50 mph). Someone remarked that the plane's starboard wing light was out, as there was no green running light. As the light got closer, we then saw that the bright medium sized light was not red, but orange. When the bright orange light stopped, about 1/4 mile or less away, we were all stunned, as we all thought it to be a Navy patrol plane and there were no other ships capable of handling a helicopter.

Our ship was doing about 15 knots (approx.) and the light was doing the same at about 400 feet altitude to our port quarter. Our air search radar was off. One of the officers said he would run up to C.I.C. and track it on radar. He left and within two minutes the orange light started moving faster than us to about 30 knots for about 5 to 6 seconds, still approximately 400 feet altitude. Then, at about a 50° angle, the light went right out of sight in less than 4 seconds. We all knew it was not an aircraft of this world. Why?

First, the acceleration was too fast for a human to withstand.

Second, and above all, there was no sound.

The orange light was a steady light and not pulsating. We all took it for granted that the sighting was reported and logged in the ship's log. The officer who went to C.I.C. to turn on the radar never did pick it up on the screen.

2) I am now retired out of the Navy and started flying radio controlled aircraft for a hobby. We fly every weekend, weather permitting. Our flying sight is located between Oroville and Chico (about 80 miles north of Sacramento, California). I now live in Oroville.

I was teaching a new member to fly (his first lesson). There were approximately ten other members at the field. The sky was pocked with small white clouds, clear blue sky behind them and between. As I took the new member's plane off the ground and headed north, making a left turn to the west, one of the members said, "hey! Look at that!" And another said, "It looks like a flying saucer." and everyone laughed.

As I put the R/C plane in the area they were all pointing to, I noticed that the object was almost round and a dull silver color. It was about 70° angle above the horizon and to the north. It seemed to be in the clouds at the same altitude.

At first, the others and I thought it to be a hot air balloon from Chico. All but four members turned away. Then, one

of the four said that the thing didn't have a gondola hanging from it and that it wasn't moving with the clouds.

I flew the R/C plane into the area again and it was still there. Approximately three minutes had now passed from the first sighting. By now the four members were very excited. I landed the R/C plane to get a better look at the object. I looked up and it was still there. Then it started moving slowly to the southeast at the same altitude, going through the clouds, at approximately 30 to 50 mph level flight for approximately 4 to 6 seconds. Then (as in sighting -1? it assumed an angle of about 60° and it was out of sight in approximately 3 to 4 seconds. No sound. No light.

We speculated that the (E.T.) were tuned in on our R/C transmitters and couldn't figure out what we were doing. One of the four was a school teacher at Paradise, CA. The other three were all sober adults.
